

Editor's Comment



WHETHER we like it or not, Frodsham's evening economy is important to the town. But unfortunately it also brings problems – as it does anywhere else with a thriving pub, club or restaurant trade. It brings anti-social behaviour.

So it is good to see the Town Council looking seriously at the possibility of installing CCTV cameras in the town.

It was looked at previously a couple of years ago when it received a mixed greeting, with some councillors expressing concern at the cost. But since then, new technologies have brought costs tumbling down and there now seems to be no difference of opinion on the issue.

Now is the time for Frodsham to

be pushing for CCTV, Cllr Mallie Poulton told the Town Council, and he was right.

Cameras already have a proven track record of enabling police to arrest those responsible for antisocial behaviour and, perhaps even more importantly, giving them the ability to reach hotspots quickly enough to stop trouble before it even starts. Live cameras, that is. They may be more expensive than the ones that simply record the street scene, but they are worth the extra cost. Just ask the police in Chester or Warrington.

It is a pity that Frodsham is beginning to suffer the same evening economy problems as its larger neighbours but it is no good

pretending it doesn't happen.
The Town Council is to seek a roundtable meeting with the police, Cheshire West and Chester, Pubwatch and other interested parties. There is an indication that Castle Park Trust would be prepared to put some money into a scheme, subject to a quite reasonable request that the cameras covered the park as well as the town centre. There have been some encouraging noises from the police. So, yes, the time is right.

Another possibility is getting involved in the Great British High Street – an event to highlight local shops. But it was decided there was a need to meet with local retailers to check if there was any appetite for getting involved.

The Post Office: use it or lose it, says pensioner

A FRODSHAM man is urging fellow pensioners who have their pensions paid into a Post Office card account to carry on doing

Nick Rolfe was concerned when he received a letter from the Department for Work and Pensions asking him to switch to a bank,

"Most people use one of these accounts," the letter stated.

Mr Rolfe, who had only recently ""

suffered the inconvenience of his bank closing its Frodsham branch, decided to do some research. He discovered that letters had

been sent to pensioners all over the country, some on a Department for Work and Pensions letterhead but others on a HM Government letterhead. Both were signed, simply, "Office Manager" and the confusing wording led some people to believe it was a scam.

Some were worded more bluntly than others. While the one he received "asked" him to use a bank, building society or credit recipient to make the change and claimed most people had already

done so. In fact, Mr Rolfe discovered, almost two million people still have pensions paid into a Post Office card account and under a seven year deal signed in 2014 can continue to do so until 2021. Many of them are older people who don't want to make a change.

There was no mention of this in the letter, however.

In fact, most current accounts

can be accessed via a post office branch, so most people would still be able to draw their pensions at a post office.

But Mr Rolfe is concerned that the changes may result in some people stopping using the post office - and that any decline could

result in closures.

"Frodsham now has only one bank so we don't want to be losing any post offices. They bring people into town so if we lose any we could eventually lose shops as well."

Town council put off decision on new home

FRODSHAM Town Council has put off a decision on moving to a new home – probably until the New Year.

The council went into private sessions to consider four possible locations – with a recommendation from the Policy and Process Committee that the council should move to Halpin House, on Frodsham Station car park.

Three other options had been considered by the Policy and Process Committee – staying on the first floor at Castle Park House, renting the former HSBC bank building or purchasing the former Nat West Bank building.

But after a lengthy debate, it was decided to defer a decision. A number of councillors expressed a preference for remaining at Castle Park House

Earlier, a member of the public, Mr Terence Dillon, had addressed the council on the issue.

He said he had been a resident of Frodsham for 68 years and was not happy at the recommendation that the council should move to Halpin House, nor that the matter was to be discussed at a closed session of the council.

Castle Park had been left to the people of Frodsham and had always been the home of the Town Council, he said.

Halpin House was unsuitable because many people would not be able to get to it without a steep climb. There were also parking difficulties – would people be expected to pay to use the station car park when visiting the council offices?

Parking at Castle Park would always be free, he said.

He criticised the council for going into private sessions – "like" a secret society" - to discuss the

The people of Frodsham were

entitled to know the cost of the options to be considered, he said.

Chairman Cllr Judith Critchley explained it was necessary to discuss the matter in private because some of the information was commercially sensitive.



High school readers are among the best in the North West

TWO teams of Helsby High School's best Year 7 and 8 readers out-performed some of the top schools in the North West in the regional heats of the international "Kids Lit Quiz".

The two teams were asked 100 questions over 10 rounds and consistently scored excellent points in every round, working well together to produce outstanding performages. performances.

One team scored 79 out of 100 to clinch third place while the other

were just two points shy of a win, scoring 80 out of 100.

Both teams out-performed many competitors including Kings' Chester, Wirral Grammar and Merchant Taylors to make it into the top the competition. the top three teams from the North West.

There was also success for Helsby in the teachers round.
Six of the students were Year 7

which means they are eligible to compete again next year – and are already in training.





Police move into fire station

FRODSHAM Police Station is now located at the fire station on Ship Street.

The facility was officially opened by Police and Crime Commissioner David Keane, in the presence of Cllr Stef Nelson, deputy chairman of Cheshire Fire Authority, Chief Fire Officer Paul Hancock and Acting Chief Constable Janette McCormick.

Members of the public were consulted before the decision to move the police station into the fire station and of 358 Frodsham residents surveyed, 95 per cent agreed the relocation was

appropriate.

Mr Keane said: "I am delighted with this shared base for police and fire in Frodsham. Working together will reduce operating costs for both organisations and most definitely improve joint working between police officers and firefighters."

Frodsham Fire Station is staffed by on-call firefighters who respond to emergencies by an alerter system. It was identified as a suitable location for a joint police and fire base with the space and facilities to accommodate the same services for officers, staff and members of the public that were previously delivered at the police station.

Mr Hancock said: "This

Mr Hancock said: "This collaboration will not change the way that Frodsham firefighters or police officers respond to emergencies. This cost-effective move brings operational staff together under one roof and will allow for savings to be made by both organisations without affecting the level of service we currently provide."



Council to hold fewer meetings

FRODSHAM Town Council is to again cut the number of meetings it holds to try and reduce the work load for councillors and staff.

The full council is to continue to meet once every two months – and now committees will follow suit.

Back in April, members decided the full council should meet every other month instead of monthly as in the past. But committees were to continue meeting monthly.

The idea was to improve the work/life balance of councillors and reduce the heavy administrative work load for staff. But six months on, it has become clear the change has not had the desired impact. In fact, it has made things more complicated.

made things more complicated.
Faced with the choice of reverting to the old system of holding both full council and committee meetings monthly, or holding all meetings once every other month, councillors – after liaising with staff - have decided to trial the latter.

The decision means full council

The decision means full council will not meet again until January 8 and only two committees – Policy and Process and Community – will meet again this year, on December 11 and 19 respectively.

But in the event of urgent business additional meetings of

But in the event of urgent business, additional meetings of either the council or its committees can be called.

Question:

What should I do if I feel I have a case with a dispute over an Inheritance and what is the process?

Answer:

The most important piece of advice we can give is that you should get legal advice as early as possible. It is always much easier to dispute the validity of a Will before a Grant of Probate has been issued. Sadly, we have seen many cases recently where individuals who have tried to save costs by dealing with matters themselves. By the time these clients have sought legal advice, the other side have already incurred significant costs, which does make a case more difficult to settle.

You should keep all relevant documentation, you may not think they will help with the case but they can be crucial, so it is important that you discuss with your legal team. We recently dealt with a claim by our client's brother. Before the dispute ever arose, they were on good terms and he had sent her emails which totally contradicted the terms of the case he sought to present to the court

We do recommend that mediation is considered an early stage, this can help avoid the risk and worry of a protracted court case.

...And above all, we ask that you are patient. When we are instructed by clients we do take steps to resolve your case as quickly as possible, however there are often factors outside our control which can delay the pace of progress. For example;

- the "Pre-Action Protocols" will often allow a party receiving a claim in the region of 3 months to decide whether or not to defend it.
- sometimes it is necessary to obtain the medical records relating to the person who has died, and the process can be slow, in one case it took almost a year.
- there can be long delays with courts

High school drama spans 405 years



STUDENTS and teachers at Helsby High School got together to produce another in their highly successful series of original drama productions – "Cat Got Your Tongue."

The play was written by staff and students from Years 7 to 13, working together on lighting, sound, costumes and production. The story followed an immortal being from the year 1605 to 2010

Unbeknown to Johann these three words will trigger an alignment of occurrences, which offer him a release from his eternity, but he can't trust anyone enough to say them.

After losing his first love he vows to never love again until he meets Eva in 2010, a young woman that looks exactly like the Love he lost in 1605. In time Eva changes him and for the first time he learns to say "I love you" - but tragically it is too late.

Rare spiders found in Delemere Forest



TWO rare spiders have been found in Delamere Forest following a recent survey.

The survey.

The survey, carried out by the Tanyptera Trust, revealed the present of the jumping spider, Sitticus floricola at two sites, bringing the total number of sites in Cheshire to 10 and the money spider, Glyphesis cottonae, at four sites, almost doubling the number

of sites in Cheshire.
Sitticus floricola, measuring
3.5mm and 7.5mm across, is a
small day- hunting spider which
uses its big eyes to judge its
impressive jumps.
The British Arachnological

Society recently published their Spider Status Review in which Glyphesis cottonae was listed as vulnerable (nationally rare), and Sitticus floricola as near threatened (nationally rare).

Both species live on sphagnum found in the boggy areas of Delamere Forest.

Extensive restoration work carried out over the last four years, through a partnership between Cheshire Wildlife Trust and the Forestry Commission, has involved re-wetting areas of the forest to bring them back to their natural

state.

Katie Piercy, Delamere Mossland officer at Cheshire Wildlife Trust has been involved in the project to re-wet areas of the forest.

She said: "Species such as these rare spiders thrive in bog habitats and that's exactly what we have been working hard to create in Delamere. The fact that the number of sites where these species are Delamere. The tact that the number of sites where these species are being recorded has increased mean that our work is achieving its aim of re-establishing this habitat. Dragonflies and plant species have also benefited and we have been able to record significant been able to record significant differences in the variety of species now using the sites."

now using the sites."

This habitat restoration project won a Chartered Institute of Ecology and Environmental Management Best Practice award this year. The work is supported by Natural England, WREN's FCC Biodiversity Action Fund, the British Dragonfly Society and Cheshire West and Chester Council.



Prestigious award for Helsby High students

TEACHERS and students from the history department at Helsby High School were presented with a prestigious award at the House of Lords in recognition of their work for the Legacy 110 First World War commemorative project.

Helsby was one of six schools to receive an award, out of more than a thousand nationwide which had taken part in the project.
