

Public apathy is the only excuse CW&C will need to do what they want anyway.



#### Council move to protect its own land

MEMBERS of Frodsham Town Council's community committee are recommending moves to protect the council's land assets.

They will recommend the full council to agree to register all council-owned land, except Ship

Street, with Cheshire West and Chester Council (CW&C) and with Fields in Trust.

The committee was told that registering land as assets of community value with CW&C would give local communities six

months to find the funds to buy the land while registering with FIT provided contractual protection.

Cllr Judith Critchley concerned that registering with FIT would tie future councils to long term maintenance costs

Cllrs Mark Nield and Cllr Alan Oulton felt it was the council's duty to protect as much land as possible.

The committee agreed recommend that all council land, with the exception of Ship Street, be registered with both CW&C and FIT.

## Does Frodsham want to

A CONSULTATION exercise to gauge public opinion on the future of Frodsham's historic Good Shed has been launched by Cheshire West and Chester Council (CW&C).

Residents have until Friday, July 13 to submit their views – but the authority has warned that because of the tight timescales involved, it may be necessary for them to submit a planning application to demolish the Goods Shed before the end of the consultation.

DW&C says car parking at

Frodsham Station is becoming increasingly difficult and, with the imminent re-opening of the Halton Curve, the pressure on the car park will only increase.

The 'council is keen to seek solutions to maximise the number of available parking places at the station car park.

"As a minimum, it is planned to surface and properly line the rough ground at the bottom of the car park but this alone will not meet the anticipated demand that has been identified in the council's parking strategy," the council states.

anticipated demand that has been identified in the council's parking strategy," the council states.
"It is therefore proposed to demolish the goods shed which would provide up to 60 additional parking spaces and improve the trontage to the station platform with attractive landscaping."

CW&C says it is keen to understand what local opinion is on this proposal.

But the council adds: "Due to the short timescales concerning the Halton Curve, CW&C may need to submit a provisional planning application for demolition before the end of the consultation. "Please be assured that the council will take into account

"Please be assured that the council will take into account the outcome of the consultation before deciding whether or not to progress the application. Should the application be progressed there will be a further (statutory) consultation."


More than three years ago, Frodsham Foundation – which was dissolved in March last year – put forward proposals to re-develop the Goods Shed – having been offered a 25-year lease on the building by CW&C, who own it. But an application to the Heritage Lottery Fund for a grant to help fund the project was rejected so the scheme was never progressed.

At the time it was estimated cost of restoring the building would be around £1.3 million and a survey carried out by Frodsham Town Council indicated that 80 per cent of respondents would like to see the building renovated for public use.

### Deputy Mayor has made up his mind



FRODSHAM's deputy Mayor, Cllr Liam Jones, has already given his response to the Goods Shed consultation. He said: "I think, if the proposed plans were to go ahead, we will have missed a golden opportunity

have missed a golden opportunity for Frodsham to add something great to our town, that could help our local economy and be a gateway to our town with the extra footfall from the Halton Curve.

The proposals to create 60

additional car parking spaces will only be a sticking plaster and not a long term solution to the car parking problem that we have."

Cllr Jones said he would like to seen Cheshire West and Chester Council develop a plan to use the Goods Shed as a community, cultural, technology driven hub for the benefit of the community.

He said other parts of the borough, such as Neston and Northwich, had benefited from

investment with new leisure facilities. He would like to see a fair share of investment in Frodsham.

decision coincided with


Paul's wife, Lindsay, also being made redundant so it was a "no brainer" said Paul. "Lindsay loves gardening, so it made sense to give it ago'.

## Allotments proposal for Ship Street land

A RESOLUTION calling on Frodsham Town Council to offer land in Ship Street for allotments and "non-commercial" ventures

on Saturday, July 7.

The resolution, proposed by Mr I Blake, suggests the land could be used for allotments for

town residents.

It suggests the tenancy could be held by a not-for-profit group who would manage the land for a period to be agreed and then reviewed.

The Town Meeting is due to be held at the Parish Hall, Church Street.

It is due to start at 12 noon, when residents can meet informally with Town Council and other Town group representatives on matters of interest to the town, including the Neighbourhood Plan, play, crime, community development, planning and

community activities.

The meeting has been called by the Town Council, but it is not a council meeting and is intended to give electors from Frodsham an opportunity to raise issues with the council and other organisation.

A formal meeting will start at 1 pm when the minutes of the Annual Town Meeting held in March will be noted and the council's annual report will be presented.

It is during the formal meeting that the resolution regarding the Ship Street land be used for allotments will be tabled.

The council has suggested the land be sold for housing – and the meeting will receive a presentation from the Weaver Vale Housing Trust on their proposals for the land if they were to purchase it.

Álso on the agenda is an item to discuss possible uses for the capital receipts if the land were sold.

While it was not as serious as the peat fires which have devastated miles of moorland in Lancashire, it was a serious incident – and a warning that people should ensure they do nothing that could spark off fire during a sustained period of hot, dry weather.

The fire service issued the

- following advice:
   Avoid lighting open fires in the countryside
- Do not leave bottles or glass in woodlands
- Keep children and ball games away from barbecues
- Extinguish cigarettes and other smoking materials properly
  Only use barbecues in suitable
- and safe areas and never leave them unattended
- Never throw cigarette ends out of car windows they can ruin whole fields of crops
- Ensure that barbecues fully
- extinguished and cold before disposing of the contents Sunlight shining through glass can start large fires take glass bottles/jars home or put them in a waste or recycling bin

## Frodsham's oldest resident dies at 105

His funeral took place at St Laurence Church and his hearse was escorted by a vintage fire

Pennington, former Mayor Mallie
Poulton, ex- council chairman Cllr
Judith Critchley and the present
chairman Cllr Alan Oulton - himself a former fireman - have all sent condolences and sympathy to Mr

Miller's family.

Mr Miller is believed to have been the oldest retired firefighter in

the country.
When he celebrated his 100th birthday, he visited Frodsham Fire Station and was given a standing ovation by firefighters.

He had dreamed of being a

fireman from the age of 10 after seeing local crews battle a blaze that wiped out trees on Overton

But his most memorable time was during World War 2 when he and other local firefighters were drafted into Liverpool to fight fires caused by the Nazi bombers who blitzed the city.

He was also once transferred to Bournemouth to support local firefighters at a time when a Nazi invasion was thought to be imminent.

Mr Miller continued as a firefighter after the war, rising to the rank of sub-office and retiring in 1963.

He and his wife, Margery, who died in 1973, had two sons and a daughter, seven grandchildren and six great grandchildren.
