Editor's Comment

FORGIVE us, please, if we again return in this column to the topic of the Goods Shed and parking provision at Frodsham

Elsewhere in this issue you will read that Cheshire West and Chester Council (CW&C) is looking into the possibility of constructing a two-deck car park at the station, providing 56 parking spaces, which could be built in the event of local businessman Paddy Bleakley coming up with a viable proposal for the re-use of a refurbished Goods Shed.

Demolished

That's only four less than the 60 spaces which, according to CW&C's questionable calculations, would become available if the Goods Shed was demolished. And don't forget the very persuasive argument put forward by Frodsham resident Professor Andrew Basden last summer, that in fact the figure

of 60 is spurious anyway.

He pointed out that getting rid of the Goods Shed would provide only 17 extra spaces because the other 43 could be provided with demolishing the historic old

building.
Whether or not the council's two-deck car park will require any of deck car park will require any of the 43 spaces we can't pretend to know, but even if it does, it would appear the capacity for providing extra parking at the station without demolishing the Goods Shed is significantly greater than CW&C was prepared to admit. Of course, the two-deck car park plan has only emerged since Mr Bleakley came up with his

proposals, which suggests it has not even been thought of.

Could CW&C really have been prepared to demolish a building that Frodsham clearly wanted to keep without first studying all possibilities? Don't forget, the proposal was already before the planning committee and was only withdrawn at the last minute.

We have repeatedly said it was not our place to take sides in the debate over the future of the Goods Shed. But we are finding it increasingly difficult not to support the 73 per cent of Frodsham people who want to keep it.

A DECKED car park, on two levels and capable of holding 56 cars, is being considered for Frodsham railway station.

and Chester West Council (CW&C) planning bosses are studying the idea tollowing the decision to put on hold the application for planning consent to demolish the Goods Shed to make way for parking spaces. This is to allow local businessman

Paddy Bleakley time to develop his propósals to cónvert the Goods Shed into a unique destination venue for local organisations, complete with

bar and cafe.

But CW&C chiefs stress that no

firm decisions have been made yet.
The proposal to demolish the
Goods Shed (below) to make way

for additional parking at the railway station was strongly opposed by Frodsham people, 73 per cent of who have indicated they would be opposed to the scheme
The Town Council has

opposed the scheme.

Mr Bleakley – the man behind the successful transformation of Kash 22, in Church Street, Frodsham - believes the Goods Shed is an important landmark from a bygone age that has gone unused for too long.

He has a proven track record of creating a thriving hospitality business, organising events, promoting local musicians and

supporting the local community and believes the old building presents an opportunity to stimulate the local economy as a strong, creative hub rather than simply a parking lot for


The Goods Shed would need refurbishment extensive adaptation - and this would require private funding.

Families left homeless after gritter crash

TWO families at Helsby were left homeless just eight days before Christmas after a gritter lorry plunged off the A56 Chester Road and caused serious damage to two houses.

The recently-built houses – on the site of the old Robin Hood pub – were thought to be structurally unsafe after the crash, which occurred at 1 am.

One house was left with a gaping hole in its front wall while the other suffered serious cracking of the front wall.

The two families were evacuated immediately and went to stay with family and friends.

Fortunately, no-one was injured – including the driver of the council gritter lorry who was initially trapped in his crushed cab but eventually released by firefighters. He was taken to hospital but was discharged shortly afterwards.

Building control officers from Cheshire West and Chester Council were swiftly on the scene to advise on safety and security.

An early inspection of the properties suggested that one at least might have to be partially demolished to enable repairs to be carried out.

But it was clear the families would not be spending Christmas at home and it is likely to be some time before the properties can be repaired.

The incident resulted in the A56 being closed for most of the following day. Bus services were disrupted and motorists faced diversions.







COMMUNITY GRITTING SCHEME WINTER 2018/19



As Cheshire West and Chester Council do not grit our public pavements and footpaths, Frodsham Town Council (FTC) have decided to run a Community Gritting Scheme again this winter and are seeking volunteers to grit pavements and footpaths near their homes.

FTC will arrange for bags of grit to be delivered to volunteers homes, probably four times through the winter, depending on the severity of the weather. The grit is for use on public pavements and footpaths only, not roads or private drives.

FTC's Liability only extends to the supply and delivery of the grit to volunteers registered addresses. Thereafter volunteers will spread the grit having regard to the Community Gritting Scheme guidelines and without the involvement of the Council.

FTC will have no responsibility for when the grit is spread; accidents or incidents that occur through failure to spread the grit; or accidents or incidents that occur during the spreading of grit by volunteers.

Volunteers from previous years will need to re-register with FTC for the new scheme. Application forms are included here and also available from the Council Office.

Lawyer campaigns for blame-free divorces

A FRODSHAM family lawyer is campaigning for a change in the law to reduce the fallout from divorce on children, after new figures revealed the impact of conflict between separating parents.

In a new poll, 79 per cent of the population agreed conflict from divorce or separation can negatively affect children's mental health, a figure rising to 87 per cent among those who experienced their parents' divorce as children.

Seventy seven per cent said conflict could affect children's academic performance and a further two-thirds felt social interactions and the ability to form healthy romantic relationships were also jeopardised.

Linda Hunter from Frodsham based Rowlinsons Solicitors is lobbying for change as part of a national "Good Divorce Week" that is being led by Resolution, who campaign for a fairer family justice system and commissioned the new YouGov poll. Good Divorce Week aims to provide practical help, highlighting

Good Divorce Week aims to provide practical help, highlighting ways for separating parents to put their children's needs first, as well as calling on government to urgently remove blame from the divorce process.

As 200,000 people divorce

divorce process.

As 200,000 people divorce each year in England and Wales, an overwhelming 79 per cent of the public support measures that would remove blame from the divorce process, with 71 per cent believing change is urgently needed to reduce the negative impact on children.

Miss Hunter. who is a

Miss Hunter, who is a Collaboratively trained lawyer and mediator, specialising in family law, explained that while most parents she works with want to keep a child's best interest at the forefront, the current fault-based

divorce system can make this a challenge.

She said: "Each day I work with separating parents to help them resolve their own issues in a way that provides a fair outcome to everyone in the family, especially any children. But often, even with the most amicable break up, the requirement to apportion blame for the breakdown of the marriage can create unnecessary conflict that can often threaten the entire process.

"Currently, unless a couple can prove that they have been separated for two years with each of them providing their consent or five years without the consent of one party, the only way to get a divorce is to attribute blame. Around 60 per cent of divorces in England and Wales are based on fault, compared with only 6-7 per cent in Scotland, where the law is different.

"Many couples are surprised that

they cannot just cite 'irreconcilable differences' or say they've grown apart.

"With 90 per cent of professionals saying the current law makes it harder to reduce conflict between exes, Resolution has been campaigning for decades to remove blame from the divorce process. Evidence shows the impact of conflict stemming from the requirement to blame can have a detrimental effect on the couple and any children they may have."

Happy New Year

The famous 'F Word'

Ask anyone at Cheshire West and Chester Council about the "F" word and they will tell you it's fabulous Frodsham. We have a long-standing reputation at the Council for making sure that Frodsham's needs and aspirations are constantly being raised within the council generally and in the Council chamber in particular. Of all the council's 75 councillors we are both amongst the top contributors to debates and in raising questions and challenges – the fuss we created over the state of our roads recently being a case in point.

Leaving aside all our efforts in the debating chamber we've explained the local priorities to successive CWaC Chief Executives in 2015, again in 2016 and again to the newly appointed Chief Executive in 2018.

However, in spite of ensuring that the needs of Frodsham are constantly being raised – the Labour controlled council ignore us – other than to ensure that we have received the highest council tax rises anywhere in the Borough. We've received a particularly painful double whammy from them because, in addition to the 'maxed-out' council tax rises CWaC has given us each year, CWaC also took money from FTC forcing that council to put up its element of the council tax. Hence the double whammy which has contributed hugely to the 15% council tax rise we've all had to pay since Labour took power locally in 2015. Nowhere else in the Borough has faced higher increases.

New Year's resolution

We want all this to change in 2019 and this is our New Year's Resolution.

We're ensuring that the pressure on the council is such that even though they have ignored us for the last $3\frac{1}{2}$ years this won't be able to continue.

Did you know that CWaC Labour has ignored us even though each year there has been a surplus on the council tax collected, even though they created a £6m fund at the last

budget (February 2018) that hasn't even now been allocated, even though they continually report budget underspends and when the government is providing additional grant monies such as to repair our roads.

In 2010 CWaC's revenue budget was £244m with Council tax reduced in real terms by 14% to 2015; in 2018 its budget was £278m. In spite of these significant additional funds, not to mention the significant capital resources available (did you know the council is underspent on its budget to finance its borrowings) Labour has chosen not to invest in Frodsham. They did choose to spend much more money on consultants though – and have precious little to show for it.

We want a fair deal for Frodsham

A fair deal for Frodsham would see:

- Our roads and footpaths repaired and properly maintained

 getting our share of CWaC's resources and the extra
 money the government has provided specifically to repair
 the roads and potholes;
- Significant investment in Leisure facilities that we've always happily shared with our friends in Kingsley, Helsby and the other surrounding villages – we were next for investment in leisure in 2015 – but Labour has chosen not to invest in our leisure facilities;
- Investment in our public car parks building capacity, encouraging people to come to Frodsham, making life easier for those who struggle with mobility, supporting our local shops and businesses, encouraging the use of public transport whilst protecting our residential roads – and doing away with unnecessary car parking charges;
- Action to protect our air quality and to reduce traffic congestion – not yet more delays as we've endure so far;
- A real and effective CCTV system covering the centre of Frodsham, community assets such as Castle Park and Saltworks Farm and any residential area where it is needed to deter anti-social behaviour.

New hope for the kids not picked for the school choir!

KIDS who were never picked to be in the school choir can take hope from the story of Frodsham Sings member Jackie Pooler.

Like many adults she thought singing was for soloists only until she "found her voice" by joining the community choir founded by Frodsham Transition Initiative in

"When I first saw the choir performing I was so impressed I thought I'd give it a go."

She did just that and now extols the benefits of singing in a choir. Choir members report that

singing:
"Lifts my mood and keeps me

"Takes me 'out of myself', and is a reason to get out"

'Gives me a sense of 'belonging' by having the communal goal of making a piece of music together."

"Makes me "Feel as though I've done a workout."

The British Lung Foundation has developed a 'Singing for Lung Health' programme (www. blf.org.uk/support-for-you/singing-for-lung-health), and the Royal Brompton & Harefield Royal Brompton & Harefield NHS Foundation Trust, the largest specialist heart and lung centre in the UK, has the 'Singing for Breathing' programme. Both Breathing' programme. Both of these, teach patients an understanding of breath control through the use of the voice, which Breathing' helps them to feel more in control of their breath and so manage their symptoms better.

There are many other lesserknown charities that run choirs as a means of improving health we cater for all tastes!

Frodsham Sings has about 70 members and is an inclusive choir, so everyone, able or disabled, is welcome. There are no auditions, nor a requirement to read music. Free taster sessions are offered

Jackie said: "I joined the choir last year. We sing a wide range of songs from Abba, George Ezra, Carol King, the Everley Brothers, Barry Manilow and many others –



Inspector throws out plan for "incongruous dwelling"

A PLANNING inspector has thrown out an appeal against the refusal of planning permission for a new dwelling in the grounds of Simons Delf, a large detached house in Simons Lane, Frodsham.

large détached house in Simons Lane, Frodsham.

The scheme, which involved refurbishing an existing single-storey garage to create an additional dwelling on land next to Simons Delf, was originally turned down by Cheshire West and Chester Council (CW&C).

An appeal was lodged and subsequently heard by Mr S.J. Lee, an inspector appointed by the Secretary of State.

Mr Lee said the appeal related to a domestic garage in the grounds of a large detached house in a quiet country lane.

He concluded the development would result in an extremely small dwelling wholly out of character with the scale and nature of Simons Delf.

"I saw nothing of a similar scale or design in the area and I also see nothing innovative in converting a domestic garage into a dwelling and it

nothing innovative in converting a domestic garage into a dwelling and it would not result in a well designed and complementary house.

"I consider the creation of a small and incongruous dwelling such as this

would be out of place in its context.

Mr Lee said the development would be in an unsustainable location, that there would be no need for the development to be in the open countryside and there would be harm to the character and appearance of the area.
